Reading is Important

As well as having our 'class reader', pupils have opportunities to take home a book of their choosing to read for pleasure from the book corner, and a book with a coloured label on the spine which denotes our reading level. These books must be kept in their reading bag or book folder and brought in every day.

It is very important that your child brings in their book every day as we often provide opportunities to read in class. Please ensure your child's book is returned every Friday as this is the day that pupils change their book.

Please take time to listen to your child read each day and talk to them about their book. They need to understand what they are reading – not just be able to read the words.

Try taking your child to the local library, it's free to join and borrow books.

Need to talk to your child's teacher?

Remember – you don't need to wait until Parents' Evenings to talk to your child's class teacher. Messages or information can be shared when you drop off /collect your child. If you need a conversation, make an appointment – your child's teacher will normally see you on the same day.

Reminders

Year 2 Autumn 1

RE

Kwanzaa

The children can explore a recent American festival that has its roots in the civil rights movement, and now is celebrated annually just after Christmas and New Year across America. It is not a religious festival, but rather draws on values and celebrates them. The unit uses Philosophy techniques to enquire into a traditional African story, asking the children to find meaning and questions from it. The unit then draws upon religious values and ask the children to think about these.

FRENCH

Numbers and Colours

By the end of the unit, children will be able to count in French. They will also know the names of the colours and will use this in conversation; to include describing objects. Children will also practice the basic conversational French they learned in Year 1.

SCIENCE

Uses of Everyday Materials

Children will identify and compare the suitability of a variety of everyday materials including; wood, metal, plastic, glass, brick, rock and paper. Children will also explore how the shapes of some solid objects can be changed by squashing, bending, twisting and stretching

ART/DT

London Life *Drawing and Sculpture*

Students learn about the city of London alongside geography. They will study local geography, creating artistic maps of their journey to school. They then move onto regional geography, looking at artistic interpretations of the city of London. Students study British artists Paul Catherall and Renos Lavithis developing inspiration for their own London themed drawings and sculptures. Students then use their sculptures to create a 3D map of London.

GEOGRAPHY

The UK A London Study

By the end of the unit, children will have a sound understanding of the position of the countries within the UK and the location of some major cities within England. They should develop a sense of where places are across the UK as well as more localised within central London

COMPUTING

E-safety

Children will be learning how to stay safe on the internet though emojis. Children will assign emojis (happy face/sad face) to given scenarios.

Using the Internet

Children will learn to use the Internet safely and with a purpose. Children are shown how to search the Internet using one word; how to make sense of the returned results; how to use "for kids" to return more suitable results; how to follow links and return to the search results. Children are encouraged to use a range of search engines

PE

Hockey

Children will be able to: follow simplified rules of a game; stay in a zone during a game; use and decide where the best place to be is during a game and use one tactic in a game.

Health and Fitness

Children will be able to: show how to exercise safely; describe how their body feels during different activities and explain what their body needs to keep healthy.

MUSIC

Hand, Feet and Heart

Children create group compositions with a clear structure and increasing awareness of how to use pulse, pitch and rhythm to change the mood.
