It will introduce children to the concept of worship and community and will enable them to compare the meanings of both in their own lives and within the lives of human beings.

Architecture

The students will be introduced to the concept of architecture by looking at different styles of architecture and the work of world renowned architects. They will work in small groups to design a building of their choice and turn it into a model using recycled materials.

COMPUTING

SCIENCE

Electricity

Children will associate the brightness of lamp/volume of buzzer with the number and voltage of cells. They will give reasons for variations in how components function.

GEOGRAPHY

South America

By the end of this unit, children will study South America's culture, climate and key landmarks. They will be taught the importance of trade and tourism and its impact on the local communities. Children will be taught to locate the environmental regions, key physical and human characteristics, countries and major cities of the continent. They will be able to identify the position and significance of latitude, longitude, N & S. Hemisphere and the tropics of Cancer and Capricorn. They will engage in discussions regarding climate zones, biomes and vegetation belts as well as key economic activity and trade links associated with South America.
